
Hear the rest of the story.



One of America's most respected foreign correspondents, Jon Lee Anderson is the author of THE FALL OF BAGHDAD (Penguin), an eyewitness account of the U.S.-led invasion of Iraq about which the Washington Post raved, "this book captures a time and a place that no [reader] will forget." ACE ATKING

By the time he turned 30, Ace Atkins had published three critically acclaimed novels: CROSSROAD BLUES, LEAVIN' TRUNK BLUES, and DARK END OF THE STREET. Before turning to writing full-time, Atkins worked as a crime reporter at the *Tampa Tribune*, where he earned a Pulitzer Prize nomination and a Livingston Award nomination for his seven-part series, "Tampa Confidential," about an unsolved murder of a Tampa socialite in 1956. Upon publication of his first novel, the young Alabama native drew accolades from the *New York Times*, the *Chicago Tribune*, and *Entertainment Weekly*. According to Kinky Friedman, "If Raymond Chandler came from the South, his name would be Ace Atkins." Elmore Leonard has said, "Ace Atkins is a real Ace of a writer."

Atkins, now 31, has returned to his native South and lives on a century-old farm outside Oxford, Mississippi, with his faithful mutts, Elvis and Polk Salad Annie. In his spare time he teaches at the University of Mississippi and explores Memphis, the Delta, the North Mississippi hills, and of course, New Orleans. He has recently completed the novel DIRTY SOUTH (William Morrow), a noir adventure set in the New Orleans rap industry that addresses the question: What would you do if you had only 24 hours to save the life of a friend?

JAY BARTH

A native of central Arkansas, Jay Barth attended Hendrix College in Conway, where he graduated magna cum laude with a B.A. in American Studies in 1987. He then studied at the University of North

Carolina at Chapel Hill, receiving an M.A. in Political Science in 1989 and a Ph.D. in 1994. Since 1994, Barth has been a faculty member in the department of politics at Hendrix College, where he has served as chair of the department and chair of the gender studies program. Barth has published a number of works on Arkansas politics, including his coauthorship, with the late Diane D. Blair, of the second edition of ARKANSAS POLITICS AND GOVERNMENT: Do the People Rule? (U. of Nebraska Press), which probes recent social and political events, including the election of an Arkansan to the U.S. presidency. Barth has published works on American governors, the politics of the South, and race and gender politics in such journals as Political Psychology, Polity, Women and Politics, State Politics and Policy Quarterly, and Politics and Policy. He resides in Little Rock.

CAROL BERKIN

A professor of American and women's history in New York City, Carol Berkin is a native of Alabama, a winner of the Bancroft Prize, a finalist for the Pulitzer Prize, and a regular commentator on PBS and History Channel documentaries.

Berkin's latest book is REVOLUTIONARY MOTHERS: Women in the Struggle for America's Independence (Knopf), which chronicles women's experience of the American Revolution—among them Benjamin Franklin's daughter, who leveraged her social contacts to raise over \$300,000 for the patriot cause, and North Carolina housewives who boycotted British goods. A recent rave review in the Los Angeles Times called REVOLUTIONARY MOTHERS a "lively book [that] reclaims a vital part of our political legacy.... Using a novelist's eye for detail, plot and character, Berkin vividly recounts Colonial women's struggles for independence—for their nation and, sometimes, for themselves." The New York Times Book Review described Berkin's work as "that rarest of achievements—civic education that manages to entertain."

BUZZ BISSINGER

Buzz Bissinger is the author of the classic FRIDAY NIGHT LIGHTS (made into a hit movie starring Billy Bob Thornton), which Tracy Kidder described as "an engrossing story of a high school football season.... Exciting, funny, and, above all, horrifying." According to the New York Times Book Review, "Friday Night Lights offers a biting indictment of the sports craziness that grips most of American society, while at the same time providing a moving evocation of its powerful allure." Formerly a reporter for the Chicago Tribune and the Philadelphia Inquirer, he has won the Pulitzer Prize and the Livingston Award, among other honors, and is a contributing editor at Vanity Fair. In his just-published book, 3 NIGHTS IN AUGUST: Strategy, Heartbreak, and Joy Inside the Mind of a Manager (Houghton Mifflin), Bissinger reveals the emotions and strategies involved in bigtime baseball, focusing on legend Tony La Russa—a 40-year veteran of the game—and his Cardinals during a crucial threegame series against arch-rival Chicago Cubs. Library Journal claims that this book will please "all fans of Bissinger's work and of pure baseball."

MARLON BLACKWELL

Marlon Blackwell is an architect beloved by those who've encountered—or had the good fortune to live in—his structures. From the Keenan TowerHouse, a soaring treehouse for adults, to the Moore HoneyHouse, with its glass and steel evocations of honeycombs, to more whimsical proposals like the BullFrog House and the DragonFly House, Blackwell demonstrates a reverence for nature, acute sensitivity to his clients' desires and dreams, and a craftsman's attention to details and tectonic invention. "Marlon is a storyteller, a cigar-smoking George Burns of the Ozarks," writes architect David Buege, and he "works comfortably in this complex, disheveled culture.... His eyes [are] always open to apparent ironies and eccentricities."

Like the late great Fay Jones, Blackwell is a professor at the University of Arkansas in Fayetteville. His work has received national and international recognition, including AIA design awards, and has been the subject of numerous articles in such publications as *Dwell*, *Southern Living*, and *Architectural Record*. In 1995, Blackwell was designated one of the nation's top 40 designers under 40 years old



THE BOOK GUYS: ALLAN STYPECK and MIKE CUTHBERT

The Book Guys began in the 1980s, when Allan Stypeck paid his first visit to Mike Cuthbert's public radio talk show in Washington. The basic format then was what it is now: listeners with books in their possession call the program and Allan gives them an appraisal based on their description of the books. All evaluations are contingent on a visual inspection, of course, but most callers just want to know if they have something valuable in their library or not. From there the program launches into topics both closely associated with and far afield from the book in question. Sometimes the book was made into a movie and Mike and Allan discuss who starred in the film. Sometimes there are other books by the same author that are more interesting. Sometimes "The Boys" break into song. You never know what's going to happen. Their Arkansas Literary Festival appearance will feature Bret Lott as a guest.

A Pulitzer Prize-winning reporter formerly with the New York Times, Rick Bragg hit the bestseller charts with his first book, ALL OVER BUT THE SHOUTIN', a memoir about breaking free from the poverty of his Alabama youth and finding success at the pinnacle of American journalism. The New York Times Book Review called the book a "sad, beautiful, funny and moving memoir...a report from the forgotten heart of 'white trash' America.... It is as if a descendant of the

hollow-eyed children from *Let Us Now Praise Famous Men* had stepped out of a photograph to tell his own story, to narrate an experience that even Agee could not penetrate because he was not himself 'trash.'"

MAXINE BROWN

Country music pioneer Maxine Brown was a member along with her siblings Bonnie and Jim Ed-of a popular musical trio, The Browns, in the 1950s and '60s. In her candid book, LOOKING BACK TO SEE: A Memoir (U. of Arkansas Press), Brown chronicles the sleazy side of show biz as well as the triumphs. Similar in spirit to Loretta Lynn's Coal Miner's Daughter, the book delves into her family's poverty-stricken past, beginning with a Depression-era childhood in rural Arkansas. From this humble background emerged a duo, Maxine and Jim Ed, whose 1954 song "Looking Back to See" became a top ten hit. After sister Bonnie joined them, other hits followed, including "I Take the Chance" and "I Heard the Bluebirds Sing." Early in their career, the Browns befriended young Elvis Presley, who toured with them and visited their house regularly. The group enjoyed a long relationship with RCA, and with Chet Atkins, and later joined the Grand Ole Opry cast. In 1959, their rendition of Edith Piaf's "The Three Bells" not only went to the top of the country charts but spent weeks as number one on the pop charts, leading to appearances on "The Ed Sullivan Show" and "American Bandstand."

William F. Buckley, Jr., who was born in New York City in 1925, founded the conservative journal *National Review*, where he served as chief editor for 35 years. Buckley's syndicated column "On the Right" has covered virtually every aspect of the public scene for four decades. His weekly television show *Firing Line*, which ran from 1966 to 1999, featured a lively exchange of opinion between Buckley and his diverse guests (including Germaine Greer and Margaret Thatcher, Gerald Ford and Allen Ginsberg, Groucho Marx and Noam Chomsky).

In 1976, Buckley published his first novel, SAVING THE QUEEN, which introduced his spy hero Blackford Oakes. Of his 50 books published to date, 17 are novels. His most recent books are THE FALL OF THE BERLIN WALL and MILES GONE BY: A Literary Autobiography, which reached the New York Times Bestseller List. Advance copies of his new novel, LAST CALL FOR BLACKFORD OAKES (Harcourt, May 2005), will be specially available at the Arkansas Literary Festival.

Buckley has served as a member of the Advisory Commission to the U.S. Information Agency and as a Public Member of the U.S. Delegation to the United Nations. In 1991, President George H.W. Bush awarded him the Presidential Medal of Freedom. He lives with his wife in Stamford, Connecticut.
