



of death shades over into the fantastic, or where fantasies of death erupt into reality, and from that space explore how mysterious, sad, strange, and comical it is to be alive—or, as it happens, not to be.



THE TRADITION details the normalization of evil and its history at the intersection of the past and the personal. Poems of fatherhood, legacy, blackness, queerness, worship, and trauma are propelled into stunning clarity by Brown's mastery, and his invention of the duplex-a combination of the sonnet, the ghazal, and the blues-is a testament to his formal skill.

JERICHO BROWN's first book of poetry, Please, won the American Book Award. His second book, The New Testament, won the Anisfield-Wolf Book Award and was named one of the best books of the year by Library Journal and the Academy of American Poets. His poems have appeared in several The Best American Poetry anthologies. He is the director of the creative

When Sissy's vagrant mother, Natasha, shows up on the doorstep of the family she abandoned years ago, she finds an upset husband (who is still deeply in love with her) and a little girl yearning for a mother. Can someone who covets independence settle down?



CHARLES FORSMAN is a graduate of the Center for Cartoon Studies and a three-time Ignatz Award winner. His comic books include Revenger, Celebrated Summer, and The End of the F**king World, which has been adapted into a Netflix original series.
