

ABOUT THE FESTIVAL

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his year marks the 22nd Six Bridges Book Festival, a celebration that has become both a Central Arkansas tradition and a gathering beloved by authors and readers alike. It also marks a special homecoming: after nearly two years of renovation, the Main Library once again becomes the heart of the festival. This year's festival will be a week of celebration, beginning on Sunday, September 28th, and building toward our much-anticipated Kickoff Party in the newly reopened library on Friday, October 3rd, with many festival sessions to follow there on Saturday, October 4th.

While every year brings an impressive lineup, 2025 may be one of my favorites yet. I hope every member of our community finds a session that sparks excitement. Fiction lovers will enjoy a powerhouse slate: childhood favorite Louis Sachar in conversation with Ayana Gray; literary standouts Dolen Perkins-Valdez, Maggie Stiefvater, Milo Todd, and Jennifer Haigh; romance favorites Annabel Monaghan and Regina Black; a poetry panel featuring Maria Zoccola and Jehanne Dubrow; a mystery panel with William Boyle and Lucas Schaefer; and a football panel with hometown favorite Eli Cranor and ESPN journalist Seth Wickersham—just to name a few.

For nonfiction readers, the spectrum ranges from profound to playful: Wright Thompson's searing exploration of the murder of Emmett Till; A'Lelia Bundles sharing the history of her trailblazing great-grandmother A'Lelia Walker; Juanita Tolliver's look at a pivotal night with Shirley Chisholm; Jennifer O'Brien and Peter Dunlap-Shohl's discussion on caregiving and living with lifelong illness; Liz Pelly's investigation into Spotify; Viktoria Capek's deep dive into Taylor Swift's lyrics; and Carly Anne York's lessons in "silly" science. Food lovers will also enjoy Kat Robinson's dive into Arkansas barbecue and Phillip Ashley Rix's chocolate-making demonstration.

Beyond the author sessions, two of our proudest traditions continue: Writers in the Schools (WITS), connecting nationally recognized authors with students across Central Arkansas and inspiring the next generation of readers and writers; and Little Readers Rock, our children's program in partnership with the Junior League of Little Rock, returning this year with author/illustrators Shannon Wright and Maria Hoskins, alongside crafts, snacks, and games.

As always, nearly all of the festival remains free to the public. The exception is our annual fundraising event, and this year we're thrilled to feature Shelby Van Pelt, author of *Remarkably Bright Creatures*, on Sunday, October 5th. If you love the festival and are able, I hope you'll consider joining us—your support ensures the festival thrives for years to come.

The Six Bridges Book Festival would not be possible without the collective effort of so many. To our sponsors, thank you for your generosity. To our incredible volunteers—from the Talent Committee to the moderators to the festival guides—we appreciate your countless hours and commitment. To the CALS staff, you make magic happen every year. And finally, to you, our attendees: your passion over the past twenty-two years has made this festival so vibrant and so much fun.



explores how our schools were designed to propagate the idea of white intellectual superiority, to "civilize" Native students, and to prepare Black students for menial labor. Ewing argues that these dynamics persist in a curriculum that continues to minimize the horrors of American history.


Nonfiction: Alex Vernon graduated from the U.S. Military Academy at West Point (the only literature major in his class of over a thousand),

served in combat as a tank platoon leader in the Persian Gulf War, and earned a PhD from the University of North Carolina-Chapel Hill. He is the M.E. & Ima Graves Peace Distinguished Professor of English at Hendrix College in Conway and has

written eleven books. Drawing on never-before-seen materials and featuring over one hundred interviews, Peace Is a Shy Thing: The Life and Art of Tim O'Brien is the first literary biography of the preeminent American writer of the war in Vietnam and one of the best writers of his generation. It provides a detailed account of O'Brien's thirteen months as an infantryman in Vietnam while giving equal diligence to telling the story of his life and reconstructing his writing process.

"The Biblioracle Recommends." More Than Words argues that generative AI programs like ChatGPT not only can kill the student essay but should, since these assignments don't challenge students to do the real work of writing. It calls

for us to use AI as an opportunity to reckon with how we work with words and how all of us should rethink our relationship with writing.



the Arkansas Ozarks, but now she and her best friend must discover exactly what kind of evil is stalking the darkest parts of their beloved hills.

Fiction: Once upon a time, Linsey Miller studied biology in Arkansas. These days, she holds an MFA in fiction

and is the author of Lambda-nominated What We Devour. Her other works include the Mask of Shadows duology (Belle Révolte and The Game) and the first three books in the Disney Princes series. That Devil, Ambition follows three best friends as they attempt to pass their final year of school and win tuition waivers—by killing the devil summoned to teach their class before he kills them. This thrilling stand-alone fantasy explores the lengths we'll go to get ahead in academia.


WITS is about more than just teaching writing skills. Students encounter diverse literary genres, styles, and voices, witnessing the creative process up close. Workshops and interactions




